## **Bartering: People Helping People**

In this edition of *The Encourag-er*, we will delve into the annals of history to discover the importance of "goods for goods" or bartering. To barter, is to trade by the exchange of goods or services for other goods or services without using money.

In what way does bartering offer any answers while we find ourselves in the midst of a worldwide pandemic? #### **Shortages of Food**
